The 22nd Grassroots Summit was held in North Texas from August 28 – September 3, 2012.

180 people traveled from Japan to participate in the exchange, including 53 young students and their chaperones from Miyagi and Iwate prefectures which were badly hit by the earthquake and tsunami in 2011.
